You will write a report summarizing your visit to the museum. The essay should be at least two pages. At the beginning, please include your name, course number, assignment name and date of visit. Each test will be a combination of matching artworks to information and two take-home essays. The tests will be taken one week after the end of a section, to give you time to study and write your take-home essays. Please see the <u>Test Checklist and Rubric</u> for full information.

Section Test Guidelines:

- 1. Part One: you will match selected artworks to statements about the artwork identifying styles, techniques and/or contextual information. (30 points).
- 2. Part Two: a take-home essay that is a formal and contextual analysis of an artwork chosen by you from those studied during that section. You will describe the formal and contextual elements and why they are important to understanding the artwork (35 points).
- 3. Part Three: a take-home essay in which you compare and/or contrast one work of Japanese art studied in that section to a Western work of art; you chose the two artworks to compare/contrast. You will describe the formal and contextual elements and why they are important to your understanding the two artworks (35 points).

Assignment: Research and Analysis Paper

Due Date: On February 4, 2016 each student will indicate the date they would like to submit their paper and make their presentation. Dates will be assigned first come, first assigned.

% of grade: 20% (200 points)

You are to choose one work of Japanese art from the textbook or from your research. You will complete research on the traditions followed in the work, why the work was created, how it was used, the period in which it was created and if known, the artist who created the artwork. If the artist is unknown, you will include general information about artists at that time: how they worked, their patrons, their techniques and common subjects. With this information, you will write a formal and contextual analysis of the artwork.

The analysis should be typed, double-spaced, a reasonable typeface and size (I suggest Times New Roman 12 point and with no less than 1" margins to either side and .75" margins top and bottom). There should be a cover page that includes a digital image of the artwork (identify title, artist, date, size, medium, museum and URL), and your name, course number and date. The analysis should be 3 - 4 pages long. The references and resources should be listed on an additional page. This makes a total of 5 - 6 pages.

You must number all references and resources. In your paper, after a quote or paraphrase, indicate the number of the reference in parenthesis (1). See the <u>Research Report Checklist</u> and <u>Rubric</u> on the class web site for full information.
